Re: Project Labor Agreement Status Report

The Project Labor Agreement (PLA) for the Transbay Program was approved on November 10, 2011. The PLA is designed to ensure labor harmony and equal opportunity for small, local, disadvantaged, union, and non-union businesses throughout construction, providing standardized working conditions and wages. This quarterly report provides information on the status of the administration of the PLA and the apprenticeship plan that was developed in conjunction with the PLA.

PROJECT LABOR/LABOR HARMONY/ ACCESS TO SKILLED LABOR POOL

No work stoppages or labor incidents have affected construction on the project. The Construction Manager/General Contractor Webcor/Obayashi and its trade subcontractors have reported no issues accessing skilled labor in sufficient numbers, and each trade subcontractor's workforce demands have been met.

A breakdown of labor by trade and county of residence compiled through March 28, 2018, by Turner Construction, the TJPA's construction management oversight consultant, for the monthly construction update is shown in the two tables that follow:

SAFETY

During the first quarter of 2018, there was one OSHA recordable safety incident on March 9, and no lost time incidents. The OSHA recordable incident occurred when a Southwest Specialty employee was elevating his boom lift and pinched his right-hand little finger between the scissor lift rail and the ceiling grid. This safety incident has been reviewed, and corrective actions have been put in place.

Reports on Apprenticeship Programs/Utilization and Veterans Outreach Efforts

- Unions
- ➤ Jose F. Almanza IBEW Local 6:
 - The electricians of Local 6 will be accepting applications for this summer's apprentice training beginning in May. San Francisco city residents are encouraged to apply. Veterans who have been honorably discharged do not need to take the test; instead, they may go directly to the interview. More information on Local 6's apprenticeship and veterans programs can be found online at sfelectricaltraining.org.
- Peter Garza Sr., Carpenters Union Local No. 22:
 - Carpenters now maintain approximately 5,600 apprentices in their four-year program across the 46-county Northern California region. Contractors in San Francisco are utilizing available San Francisco residents. Local 22 is actively recruiting veterans and trying to steer those veterans to local projects.

➤ Michael Ginter, OE Local 3:

- The Operating Engineers' apprenticeship program totals over 800 apprentices across Northern California; approximately 10% of the enrollees are female, and 10% are people of color. The Operating Engineers recently purchased 100 acres in Rancho Murietta for educational and training purposes. Veterans entering the Operating Engineers' apprenticeship program now have their entrance fees as well as journeyman fees waived.
- The Operating Engineers are making a specific effort to outreach to the underserved areas of San Francisco to recruit local residents into the apprenticeship program. More information on OE Local 3's apprenticeship and veterans programs can be found online at oe3.org.

➤ Mike Theriault, SFBCTC:

• SFBCTC continues to work with the San Francisco Unified School District to link the district's multi-craft core curriculum program with entry into apprenticeship programs. SFBCTC is now working with the San Francisco Conservation Corps to implement a multi-craft core curriculum program.


